Did You Know?

- New York teaching hospitals SEGREGATE individuals based on a patient's insurance status. If you are seeking outpatient care with a specialist, the place you receive care depends on what insurance you have.
- If you are on MEDICAID or are UNINSURED, you are usually sent to a CLINIC when you need to see a specialist. Privately insured patients are seen by board-certified faculty physicians in the physician's private practice. They see the same doctor each time and experience better coordination between the specialist and their primary care doctor.
- Segregating patients based on insurance status is UN-FAIR and ILLEGAL. Segregated care disproportionately hurts Blacks and Latinos because they are more likely to be on Medicaid.
